Did You Know — Lucy Churchill

During a mild Virginia winter, Lucy may have told you that she and Gil needed a trip to the snow and cold of Vermont. Born in Alaska, she has an affinity for harsh winter weather. Her father accepted an opportunity to work with an ailing Alaskan airline. Her parents liked Alaska so much they stayed 4 years, and only returned to Minnesota when Alaska seemed unsafe during World War II. Lucille Ingeborg Bjore and her brother, Averill, grew up on the sustenance farm in central



Minnesota which their parents purchased upon return from Alaska. Their father was the son of Norwegian immigrants who settled the Midwest in the 1880s, and their mother descended from our nation's earliest European settlers. Lucy hardly remembers the time when her father did not have Parkinson's. This left Lucy and her brother responsible for much of the farm work. Averill was mechanical and kept everything running; Lucy milked cows in the summer, on weekends and often during school days. She drove both a team of horses and a tractor as needed for farming chores. She also helped care for the animals – cows, sheep, pigs, horses, chickens. Not surprising, Lucy looked forward to school in the fall for some escape.

As a first grader, Averill taught Lucy everything he learned. The small country school had 6 grades, 42 students and one teacher. Lucy spent one year doing the work of first and second graders; the next year she moved on to third grade. High school activities included cheerleading, school plays and working with the newspaper. The high school was 30 miles from the farm. Inspiration for attending the University of Minnesota and earning a degree in Home Economics came from the local 4-H agents who were students at the university.

Lucy met Gil Churchill while both worked in the university's Bulletin Room. Gil asked Lucy to a dance one day as they passed in the cloakroom. Married during spring break, both completed spring quarter before moving to Montana for Gil's internship with The U.S Forest Service. With formal educations complete, Lucy and Gil towed a 28-foot house trailer from a May snowstorm in Minnesota to stifling heat in Ft. Benning, GA for Army boot camp. Lucy was 7-months pregnant; the house trailer was not air conditioned! Wives were ordered to stay out of trouble and wear white gloves. Stints in Baltimore and DC completed Gil's ROTC active duty obligation. The Churchills returned to Minnesota with young sons Randy and Kent. Gil joined The U.S. Forest Service. Son Alan was born in Minnesota. The Forest Service took them on to Maine, Vermont, West Virginia and Wisconsin. Ralph was born in Vermont.

While in Milwaukee, Lucy and Gil embarked on his childhood dream of building a log cabin. It took 8 years of family effort to find property, cut and strip trees and erect the structure. Located 'off the grid' on a fast-flowing river, the cabin has indoor plumbing and power from a generator. Their favorite pastime at the cabin is a soak in the hot tub which is heated by an immersed wood-fired stove. They dodge mosquitos intransit!

Retirement initially took Lucy and Gil to Vermont where they helped son Randy build his timber frame home. After Randy migrated to Vancouver Island, BC, Lucy and Gil re-located to Lake of the Woods to be near their son Kent. Since moving here in 2008, Lucy has become immersed in community activities. Both she and Gil are active with Friends of the Wilderness Battlefield. Lucy is an Historic House Guide and has reminisced as she drove the tractor to cut grass at Ellwood. A LOW Lioness member since 2011, Lucy served as co-treasurer. Currently, she is AARP secretary and Tax-Aide schedule coordinator. You will find the Churchills at many bridge games here at the Lake.

Lucy and Gil delight in spending time with their sons and their families. Son Randy and Margaret live on Vancouver Island. On different occasions, the Churchills have taken grandchildren with them to the Pacific Northwest where they visited Randy. Kent and Stacey live in Fredericksburg. Their daughter, Emily, just graduated from UVA and son, Sam, is a student at New England Culinary Institute. Alan and his wife, Amy, live in Western Tennessee. The Churchills spent part of the Christmas season working on grandson Joseph's house at Middle Tennessee University where he is freshman. Ralph and his wife, Jaime, live near Chicago and have a daughter, Annika, who's a high school junior.
