When we are together with our extended family, our daughters still insist upon joining hands around the table to sing,

"The circle of love goes around, the circle of love goes around, reach out take a hand, someone needs you, and the circle of love goes around."

This is what we sang at our evening meal together in the Philippines and they want to pass this tradition on to their children. Our family has changed since we moved back home in 1980. Sadly our parents have passed away and we have lost 3 spouses around the table to divorce. Happily 6 special grandchildren have been joyfully added.

Traditions. What makes them so special and meaningful? The ones we share with family and those we remember from childhood mean the most. Some we gladly shed. In many ways we are a sisterhood. We grieve with each other at the loss of a child or spouse.

We celebrate our individual and collective achievements. We've done a lot of good things over the years and continue to do so. We're a caring group and you are most special.

In many ways, we are like family. And so I wish you a meaningful and happy Thanksgiving with family or friends who have become like family. Since we're like family, I'm passing on my "infamous" praline pumpkin pie recipe. You know I wouldn't share it with just anyone!

Praline Pumpkin Pie

Pre-heat oven to 375 and use 9" deep dish glass pie plate. If using a metal pie pan, increase temperature to 400.

One prepared 9" crust (set aside)

½ cup pecan pieces

½ cup dark brown sugar

3 Tablespoons softened butter

In food processor, add pecan pieces, dark brown sugar, and butter. Process until ingredients hold together like a paste, making sure the pecans are a fine meal. Press firmly into bottom only of the prepared pie crust so it will not float up during baking.

Filling:

2 large eggs

3/4 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar

1 Tablespoon flour

1/4 tsp. cloves

1/4 tsp ground mace

½ tsp. ground ginger

½ tsp. ground cinnamon

½ tsp salt

1 cup evaporated milk

In mixing bowl, beat eggs until frothy with mixer. Then with mixer on low, or stirring by hand, add in order the rest of the ingredients. Beat only until well mixed. Pour slowly into praline lined crust.

Bake in oven checking after 45 minutes. Cover edges of crust to prevent oven browning. Pie is done when filling is set but still slightly jiggly in center. Depending on oven 45-55 minutes total. Remove from oven and let cool on counter until room temperature. Chill in refrigerator. Garnish with whipped cream.

Did You Know—Elaine Freeland's Story

On one of the coldest days of the winter, the family gathered at the family farm for the big hog killing. The hog was slaughtered and after all the necessary work was completed, the meat was bundled and divided amongst all the families who had participated. However, that really wasn't the main event on the farm that day. A bundle of joy was born during the festivities named Elaine!

Among Elaine's childhood memories on the Alabama farm was picking cotton and stacking peanuts in the late summer and early fall with her older brother, Bill and their mom and dad. A pole was erected to throw the peanut plants on for drying. Mid-summer responsibilities included preserving the harvest from the huge vegetable garden which brimmed with butter beans, peas, tomatoes, okra, yellow squash, green beans and more. Topping off the early morning chores in the garden was a treat readily available. Her mom would drop a luscious watermelon to the ground where it split and then it became a matter of "every man for himself" especially between Elaine and Bill.

After graduating from high school, Elaine and her 2 good friends also named Elaine, attended Auburn University. Upon graduation, she joined the Boeing Company in Huntsville, Alabama working as a software engineer on the Apollo Program, the national effort to 'land a man on the moon and return him safely to earth.' On her first day of work she went to her boss' office and he directed her to a nearby desk with a typewriter. No surprise here, she made it clear he had made a mistake. Elaine met her husband Joe at Boeing. They became engaged in 1968 on the Christmas Day that Apollo 8 began its return to earth from the moon. They were married in May 1969.

After Boeing, they worked on SAFEGUARD, a program of the Cold war. Software was developed for the radar systems to protect the Minuteman silos. This eventually led to the SALT talks.

Their careers took them to New Jersey and then later to Manassas where Joe continued his work at IBM. Though Elaine was a "stay-at-home" mom, she was always very active in her sons' school.

As the boys grew older, she rejoined the workforce where she worked on software systems related to submarine trainers, submarine tactical systems and other communications programs. It was late 2005 when Elaine retired.

Elaine and Joe became fascinated with pottery in 1977, when with their young children they visited Acoma Pueblo, New Mexico, and marveled at the distinctive hand coiled pots. Years later they found further inspiration sitting at a potter's wheel in a class at Manassas Clay. While visiting a pottery overlooking the ocean in northern California, the seed was planted that their retirement home should include a studio with a view of the water. For the past 5 years they have opened their home to share their passion for an ancient, but evolving art form with the LOW community. Their beautiful pottery will soon be on sale again in their home where you can browse and buy their incredible work on November 15 and 16. Just in time for Christmas!

Elaine's mom left the family farm 2 years ago and is now at home with the Freelands. She also has a studio 'room with a view' where she does reverse painting on glass. As to the family farm, it was recently purchased by one of those high school and college friends named Elaine and her husband.

Their 2 sons, Joseph and Riley, are now married. When the 4 grandchildren come to visit the question is, "Can we do pottery – NOW?"
