#### Stamps for the Wounded

Founded in 1942, Stamps For The Wounded is a service activity of the Lions and claims the support of every US President since its founding. It helps thousands of patients through occupational therapy programs in both veterans hospitals and convalescent centers nationwide.

#### What Can Stamps Do?

Miracles, almost. Stamps can give bedridden patients, long-treatment patients, and convalescent patients, a consuming interest to fight boredom, loneliness, frustration, futility, and despair. Patients can sort and mount stamps without effort as they lie in bed. If they are ambulatory, or even in a wheelchair, they can pass happy hours soaking stamps and mounting them in albums. Even the far withdrawn, mentally disabled patient takes pleasure in using the more common stamps to make fanciful greeting cards, or to cover decorative boxes in organized therapy sessions.

#### What Stamps Do They Want?

Stamps For The Wounded accepts both domestic and foreign stamps – old or new - that are not torn or damaged, as well as stamp collecting supplies and tools. They request that each stamp retain a 1/4" border around the stamp for handling purposes, so do not remove them from the envelope paper. You may even donate the common stamps from mail you receive. These stamps are used for art projects such as decoupage, 'painting' using bits of stamps, and other crafts.

Lioness Nancy Johnston has volunteered to lead this worthwhile outreach program to support our Veterans. Brochures will be available at our next dinner meeting.

#### Women Supporting Women (Bras Delivered)

Four tubs, totally 327 bras, were delivered at the end of July to the Remote Area Medical Health Fair in Appalachia. Led by Kathy Merritt, this Lioness community service project contributed to a total of approximately 800 bras, sizes 36 to 52, available for the less fortunate women in this poor region. A special thank you to Kathy for leading this new service project and Lion Sue Simmons for delivering the bras.

Kathy is a bridge aficionado, and her goal is to play every week. While she learned how to play in college, lessons with our own Jan Lemieux helped to hone her skills and she is passionate about the game.

Kathy and Bob are enjoying living here at the Lake. She and Bob celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary in June with a fete in Winchester which was engineered by their children.

Kathy credits Lionesses Carleen Delio, Joyce Morlan and Julie Phend for recruiting her into the LOW Lionesses club. Kathy finds the Lionesses she's met since joining the club inspiring. She stressed how much she admires the organization, its members, and their contributions and accomplishments.
